Bill C-71 does not address gangs in any way.

Bill C-71 adds more Authorization to Transport (ATT) red tape. These measures would not have prevented the two young girls playing in a playground in Scarborough from being shot (Ref 4). This will not affect gangs.

Bill C-71 creates a convoluted registry of non-restricted firearms transfers. These measures would not have prevented the two young girls playing in a playground in Scarborough from being shot. This will not affect gangs.

Bill C-71 prohibits an estimated 12,000 to 15,000 legally purchased and possessed long guns. Did you know that thousands of identical rifles would remain non-restricted due to their manufacturing date or location of production? Yes, that's right; thousands will be banned while thousands will remain non-restricted. They will all remain in their owner's possession (until death). How does this affect public safety? These measures would not have prevented the two young girls playing in a playground in Scarborough from being shot. This will not affect gangs.

Bill C-71 is an attack on Canada's lawful gun owners being sold under the guise of public safety. Frankly, it is a bad bill that will waste precious resources that could be better put to use combating Canada's gang problem.
